The display will be on every evening from 1 December, but unfortunately without the usual 'Switch On'



From the Rectory

November is traditionally a month for remembering. The year is drawing to a close, the nights are drawing in and morning light comes later each day! As the leaves fall from the trees our thoughts may well turn back to reviewing the past year. This year has been unlike any other, and for so many people there will be memories tinged with sorrow. I think all of us will be glad to see the back of 2020! But there are good memories too, especially for us here in our Villages. We can look back on the wonderful way everyone worked together when we were put into lockdown, ensuring our most vulnerable neighbours were ok, and had everything they needed. Loneliness was eased by phone calls from volunteers and friends. The staff of our schools were amazing in their diligence in ensuring lessons were available for pupils at home, while being in the classroom for the children of Key workers. As I write, there is talk of a second lock-down at the end of October during half-term, to try to break the cycle of infection. 



Gone with a Bang

On Monday 19th October a metal detectorist got more than he bargained for when he discovered a World War II mortar shell in a field near the Gallops. He made a hasty phone call and a bomb disposal unit was dispatched to deal with it. The shell was detonated onsite and caused only a small explosion. Nick Gifford told the Racing Post that the field was only used for hay, which is cut every summer. On Sunday 25th a further mortar was found in the same field and similarly dispatched.

In 1942, in preparation for D-Day, much of the Findon Downs was requisitioned by the War Department and out of bounds to the public. Cissbury Ring was used as a camp for the 2nd Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders in preparation for the Normandy landings and Canadian soldiers were also stationed nearby. An anti-aircraft gun position was sited in the hillfort and much of the land within the ramparts was ploughed for food.

Then and Now

Another month has passed and all the problems of the world are still with us. Life has changed and in some ways gone into reverse. Once again it is common to have one's groceries delivered (albeit from the supermarket) like before the war. Rationing and cutbacks. In Findon weekly grocery orders would be from Wintons store by van and from Elmcroft Stores by Don Hopkins and a trade bike with a large basket on the front. Loaves from Harris the bakers in Nepcote were delivered while they were still warm Lane by Rose. On Good Friday mornings warm hot cross buns would arrive in time for us to eat them for breakfast before going to school. At school, we would go to church before starting our Easter holiday.

What fruit and veg that was not grown in back gardens or allotments was bought at Browns the greengrocer shed shop at the bottom of Stable Lane. Produce was grown on the land of Downlands Close today. Milk bottles arrived early in the 1930s. Before then milk delivery was by the Shorts' son on a motor bike with churns of milk in the side car. It was distributed from the churn with long handled measures - half and one pint ladles in the customer's own jug on the doorstep. Milk was supplied by cows that grazed in the fields of New Farm estate at Beech and Downview Roads. Meat was bought from the butcher in The Square that still remains today, although under the name of Blackwell, as it was for at least three generations. Many villagers had rabbits and chickens to supplement the butcher's meat. It is

nice to think that some things have stayed the same with the passing of time in Findon.

In these times of change due to the virus, I feel sorry for children missing out on their education that means so much for their future. My education was school from the age of five to 14, then get a job.

Today's generation are also missing out on the childhood freedoms that I had and treasured, in spite of the war being part of it. We were free to go where we pleased from an early age, telling parents where we would be by giving the name of a field or wood - Wicks, Gibbet, Butchers Croft, Broadwood, Wobble Gate and the Firs, to name but a few. I wonder if any village children today know of or where those woods or fields are. We were close to nature and what we did was ruled by the seasons. I am sure our picking and gathering did not affect the land as much and farmers ploughing the land to grow more crops. In spring we would bring home bunches of primroses, violets, bluebells and daffodils - even hedge lilac. We would eat the young leaves or the hawthorn, known as bread and cheese to us. Sorrel leaves we called vinegar leaves. As months passed we would gather strawberries, raspberries and blackberries. Mushrooms also added to the family menu. Dragging home a fallen branch would gain praise as it helped to keep the home fire burning.

On the hills it was common to see bee orchids. I wonder if they are still

growing today. It was on the weed groundsel we would look for the amber and black striped caterpillars - they were the colours of Findon's football team. Older boys would try smoking the pith from dried wild clematis stalks, resulting with a sore throat. Towards Christmas we would search for holly with berries to decorate out home and make paper chains. One field in Findon holds a special memory for me - the Wick field on the right at the roundabout end of the road to Long Furlong. In the 1930s about once a year a plane would land in the field and offer short flights to villagers (known as "flips") for a few shillings. Somehow,

my mother raised the fare and flew off, leaving a cousin looking after my brother and me on the ground. My father died when I was four years old and my brother was just two. On Mum's return to land my brother's innocent words to here were "Did you see our Dad?" We had been told that our father had gone up in the sky to heaven. He thought she had gone to visit him.

Having been in lockdown since March with ill-health, I turn to writing for pleasure and I hope it is of interest to fellow villagers. I thank old Findoners for feedback I have had.

Drama at Findon Place

The opportunity to have ITV drama filming at Findon Place all started with a phone call, 'We need a manor house, could we come and have a look, would you be interested?' Shortly after a posse of mask wearing location managers, art directors, directors of photography and producers came to have a look and settled on Findon Place being part of Grace, a new ITV drama based on the books of Brighton based crime novelist Peter James. The series features John Simm as Detective Superintendent Roy Grace.



We were to appear in the second book -Looking Good Dead - which would air in February/March time next year. I hastily read the book, anxious to not have our lovely house represented as something macabre!

As filming day approached we prepped the house a little - the script called for the house to look a little unkempt - our gardeners stopped trimming the bushes, mowing the lawns and applied more leaves to the drive to make it look more scruffy. The art team came to dress the rooms as their sets - bringing with them a whole plethora of props and furniture to create what they needed but also using a lot of what we had on site. Our stable yard was filled with trackway to allow their unit base to make their home there for the day - on site catering with a dining bus, make up and wardrobe trailers and a trailer of dressing rooms for each actor - each cleaned and disinfected on a daily basis in our brand new Covid Secure world.

Everyone on set and in the house wore a mask. Each morning everyone had to

sign into a Covid track and trace on line system to be cleared to work here and and then have their temperature taken and issued a wristband. We had a special Covid advisor whilst filming that told us how to make the environment safer - sometimes it was as simple as opening windows to improve air flow.

Filming day was an early start - 4am for the caterers and 6am for us in the house. This came in the form of huge lights being put in front of the windows to assimilate daylight which was a bit of a shock! More lights and cameras arrived together with sound equipment and masses of monitors and were put in place, actors into hair and makeup and by 7:30am they were already rehearsing their first scenes. It was all very organised and considerate of the house and us and fascinating to see what goes into making television. They filmed all day, with a break for breakfast and lunch to which we were invited to join. Throughout the day we heard the call of 'Rolling! Quiet please' and we stood still or hid away until we heard

Paws Animal Sanctuary

I am very fortunate to have a wonderful daughter, who since March has done all of my shopping. She also comes in and does all of my housework, leaving me free to spend most of the day working with the animals. I still have a few brave volunteers and we are careful to all wear masks and rubber gloves and spray all the door handles and surfaces. The hay, straw, hen food, animal food and veg are all delivered every week by a good friend, so I don't have to go out. The only time I do go out is to the vets. I have to stay outside in the car and the nurses come out and collect the cat, rabbit or guinea pig and then bring them back out again after they have seen the vet.

One person only must make an appointment with us coming to adopt or bring in an animal to the sanctuary. This is allowed only in the afternoons, after the volunteers have gone home, and people must wear a mask. We are still taking in stray and unwanted cats and Guinea-pigs and every week we get injured wildlife and birds - mostly pigeons. I ask people to put them in a cardboard box and ring the bell and then hand them in at the gate. A baby hedgehog came in today.

Please don't put slug pellets down because some of the hedgehogs we get suffer for days before they die after eating slugs and snails that have been poisoned by slug pellets.

Findon Parish Council

FPC is currently evaluating the regeneration of the Homewood Play Area after having received funding from South Downs National Park Authority (SDNPA) Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) to renovate this play area. Once the delegated Working Group have looked at proposals we will circulate plans to the village for comment and any further ideas.

We are also aware of a number of concerns with respect to traffic, speed and parking within Findon and are therefore creating a Working Group to create a strategic plan for how we might manage this, and as a means to present our vision to relevant bodies - SDNPA, West Sussex County Council (WSCC) and Arun District Council (ADC) accordingly. Should you be interested in joining the Traffic/Speeding/Parking Working Group please provide your details to Fiona MacLeod, the FPC Clerk at clerk@findonparishcouncil.gov.uk or 01903 877225 and we will be in touch to

enlist your support. It is after all one aspect of our village that affects us all.

Operation Watershed drainage work in Stable Lane started on 19 October 2020. This is a grant from WSCC to minimise the risk of the village flooding from downland run off. In tandem, FPC continues its work to return Nepcote Pond to its original condition and some excellent work has been undertaken on how we might achieve this by Councillor Porter.

Our Open Spaces Volunteers Working Group have a campaign underway to plant new trees at 15 agreed locations across the village. They have already created a nursery with a large variety of different saplings to supply this campaign. This is of course particularly timely as we are likely to lose a number of trees in the village with Ash Dieback. As ever FPC are indebted to Councillor Carr and the determined members of our Open Spaces Team.

Why we moved to Findon

I think it's more by luck than judgement that we chose to become part of the Findon community. Let me start by saying why we are here in Sussex as we're both Coventrians born and bred. I was offered a job in Worthing in 1997 a senior role in an automotive company, so it made sense to settle in the area. We became used to the area and it was so much better with clean air and the beach to walk along, something we only used to see once a year living in the Midlands. By 2005 all the engineering business here was closed and I was offered a position in Oxford which I turned down - it was way too nice in Sussex!

We've lived in Findon since July 2007, taking on a house in need of much updating as it was previously a let property (a good job I'm ok with DIY!). So what was the reason to choose this one? Well, we were in the process of buying a similar bungalow in Goring early in 2007 and we got tired of waiting for the owner to set the ball rolling for the sale. It transpired that a cat was the stopping point, as the owner wanted temporary accommodation and couldn't find one that accepted a pet.

At that time I worked for Royal Mail and Tina was working for the NHS in Outer London. I was fairly new to working on Post Delivery so I was sent on different rounds to cover for others taking leave. I learned quite quickly the many areas I'd not seen before, giving me a spectrum of new horizons. It was an arduous job

walking in the region of 15 miles a day but it kept me fit in the fresh air and I enjoyed the change of scenery (much nicer than sitting in an office). It also opened up a wide selection of areas and houses I'd not known existed!

At that time we were looking after my in-laws and were therefore looking for a house with two bedrooms and no stairs. I might add that moving south was a bit of an eye opener for property costs. They easily double the price for a similar property in the Midlands. I've never understood why, as the salaries here are lower than those in the Midlands and it's still a fair distance to travel if you work in the London area.

As the first property choice fell through, we continued looking for another similar bungalow. I was then given my first regular delivery rounds in the early part of 2007, one in Findon Valley and the other in Findon, covering the lower region of the village, two days on each delivery. I soon got used to the walk and enjoyed the scenery and the rural habitat, a lot more relaxed than the suburbs of a town. I was also able to see all the for sale signs as I covered my round along, with occasional chats with residents during the delivery. It was and still is very friendly with a homely atmosphere. I love it here. It has all the character and history of a beautiful old village with breathtaking rural surroundings and a beach just down the road.

Now, at 11 o'clock, the early frost has been burnt off by the sun shining out of a cloudless sky.

A crowd is already gathering and the Alchehorn family is ready to join in the fun. But first there is the church service. Cenric gets his wife, Lynne, to round up their two children, seventeen year old Russell and Edgar aged eight. Edgar says he is going to ask Alfred if he really burnt the cakes. "Don't you dare," his mother tells him. "He has better things to do." Then Alfred arrives and all is chaos for a while. Eventually the service gets underway. At the end the Rector gives the blessing and they all stream out into the sunshine.

Alfred smells the ox roasting. "That reminds me I have not had anything to eat since six." He starts striding down the church path. His progress is interrupted by a small boy holding onto his jerkin.

"Well my lad, what do you want." He picks him up and places him on the wall. "Please sir did you burn the cakes?" Edgar asks him.

"What is your name Son?"

"Edgar Alchehorne and that is our ox roasting"

"Well can I ask you a question. If you had to choose between looking after the cakes or thinking how to beat the Danes, which on would you choose?" "How to beat the Danes" said Edgar quick as a flash.

Alfred put the lad back on the ground, ruffled his hair, and went in search of some of that ox.

"But he didn't answer my question", said Edgar.

"Oh, I think he did," said his mother. "A King has to be a politician as well as a warrior and politicians often answer a question with another question. Why don't you go and watch the jugglers. Your father is going to have a go at the archery."

Small hard black round fungi that grow on Ash trees are still called 'King Alfred's cakes'.

Online Security - Back to Basics Advice

This year, most people and businesses have relied on the internet far more than ever before. Unfortunately, at the same time, the level of online crime and other harms has also substantially increased.

This information is intended to cover the most basic practices that we all need to follow in order to protect ourselves from the most common online threats against ourselves, our families, our finances and devices.

Your top tips for keeping safe online

Choose, use and protect **passwords** carefully, and use a **different one** for every online account in case one or more get hacked. Try using three random words and strengthening them with numbers, symbols and combinations of upper and lower case letters.

Ensure you always have **internet security software** (often called antivirus/anti-spyware) loaded on computers and a similar app on your mobile devices, and that this is kept updated and switched on. Remember that **smartphones and tablets** can get infected in a similar way to computers.

Always apply updates to operating systems and software on your computer and apps on your mobile devices. Many include vital security updates to avoid hacking or malware. Never assume that Wi-Fi hotspots in places like cafés, bars and hotel rooms are secure, so don't use them when

you're doing anything confidential online. Instead, use your data, a mobile broadband modem (dongle) or if it's for work, a VPN (virtual private network).

Always consider that online or on the phone, **people aren't always who they claim to be**. Fake emails, texts and phone calls are a favourite way for fraudsters to approach their victims.

Don't click on links in emails, posts, tweets of texts – and don't open attachments – if the source isn't 100% known and trustworthy, or it seems strange that you'd be receiving them.

Never pay for anything by direct bank transfer – including goods, services, tickets, travel and holidays – unless it's to someone you know personally and is reputable.

Never reveal too much **personal or financial information** in emails, on social networking and dating sites and in person. You never know who might see it, or use it.

Always report fraud or abuse to the appropriate authorities.

There are also two other golden rules you should remember: **think twice**, because everything may not be as it seems, and **if it seems too good to be true**, **it probably is**.


Jennifer Mayle
