From the Rectory

This is now the 2nd week of Lent, traditionally for the church a 40 day season of self-examination, penitence and fasting. After a year of Covid restrictions. I'm sure that is the last thing any of us, Christian or not, need! Prolonged periods of lock-down have allowed us all enforced time alone to ponder the meaning of life, and our own place in the great scheme of things. Nonetheless, this is still a time we can try to refocus on what is important in our lives, with perhaps a particular emphasis on healthy and sustainable eating (especially if, like me, enforced time at home has encouraged to bake, then eat, extra cakes and biscuits!)

As indeed last year, Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday have passed us by with meeting anyone outside our own household forbidden. No carnival, parades or parties for Mardi Gras -'Fat Tuesday' – when in olden days all the rich food was used up before the abstinence of the Lenten weeks. Somehow pancakes on my own didn't have the appeal of watching the queue in Findon church, with Chris at the crèpe maker, as I waited till the end hoping there would be one left for me! Hopefully next year.... Unable to offer 'ashing' as a symbol of repentance and turning back to Christ, pebbles marked with a cross were available at the lych gate of each of our three churches. I hope these help you as a focus for prayer during Lent. Historically, candidates were given instruction in the weeks before Easter,

in preparation for their baptism on Easter Sunday in a glorious Service of light and joy. Congregation members would join in this preparation by themselves undertaking study (the reason we hold Lent Study Groups today) and repentance over a period of 40 days, recalling the time Jesus spent alone in the desert after his baptism by his cousin John, fasting and overcoming temptation in the wilderness by Satan with scripture references. Our Diocesan Bishops will be holding Services of Baptism and Confirmation at various venues after Easter, so if anyone is interested in this, please contact me at the Rectory!

Again, traditionally, the question is posed, 'What have you given up for Lent this year?' Year-long restrictions have meant we have all given up so much of what we enjoy already, so my suggestion is that we all try to do something more during Lent this year. This could be as simple as getting up a little earlier every day and using that 5-10 minutes to reflect or pray, thinking of all who are dear to you but for the time being you are unable to meet up with, and wishing them well. In our villages we have so much to be thankful for - good neighbours, our local shops, our health service - and allowing a few minutes just to be thankful instead of starting the day feeling negative can make a huge difference to each day.

As I write, we are still unable to promise what we will be allowed to

Memories of D Day

May I first wish fellow residents of Findon a happy new year, be it a strange one. I also thank friends and neighbours for the get well wishes when I spent a month in hospital before Christmas with a broken hip due to an unlucky fall. I was home for Christmas then, in the new year, I reached my 92nd birthday. Once again I thank friends and family for making it a special day in spite of lockdown. I even had my request of the day for a McDonald's happy meal with toy!

We are now in lockdown again and I thought of a lockdown of sorts Findon had in the 1940s. Weeks before D Day thousands of troops were gathered in our corner of Sussex. Non-residents were not supposed to enter the area. For some reason my mother lent my identity card to a soldier's wife who wanted to return here from London. This she did, but she lost my card. I was given a replacement, which was blue instead of beige. My old number was ENMA3 and the new on was YENN1067819. I have no idea why I still remember those numbers today.


On D Day all the soldiers and tanks were gone but Findon was left with a

number of damaged walls where the tanks had little space to get through the lanes and narrow roads.

Note

Apparently, the colour of identity cards issued to adults changed from beige to blue in 1943. They had previously been the same colour for both adults and children. People were required to carry identity cards until 21 February 1952. The National Registration Act of 1939 was repealed on 22 May 1952. Editor

Findon Parish Council

Findon Parish Council (FPC) is close to completing stage 2 of its tree felling and management program and many of you will have noticed the sad loss of a number of trees. Up to 20% of deciduous trees in West Sussex are ash and up to 80% of these may suffer from ash dieback. It is our aim to remove those clearly infected and limit spread.

This naturally leaves several glaring gaps but FPC has moved quickly creating a nursery of some 300 saplings of varieties including beech, field maple, oak and rowan. So far, 30 trees have been planted at various locations across Findon.

Findon Village Hall will act as a polling station in the upcoming May 2021 elections following some work and assessment. It is good to see the hall begin to resume its role as a central part of our village.

Repairs to the road surface in Nepcote have been completed by West Sussex

County Council and whilst there have been comments as to the patch work nature of those repairs, conditions for driving are markedly improved.

FPC continues to make progress with proposed Homewood Play Area renovation and is now in discussion with Arun District Council who own the land, to move forward.

FPC has agreed the Precept requirement for the financial year 2021/22 and submitted this to Arun District Council. Our aim was to cover all requirements within current budget limits for 2021 and we are delighted that this is the case. The Precept remains at £47k which equates to an amount of £48.16 per annum for a Band D equivalent.

Findon Sheep Fair

To All Findon Residents

The Findon Sheep Fair committee have been meeting since January looking at how we can hold a show on the 11th September 2021 which will follow Government guidelines and be approved by WSCC's events Covid assessment team. We will also seek to obtain a "Good To Go" accreditation.

The idea being proposed for one year only, is to hold a much smaller show with sheep judging, and socially distanced craft stalls. There will also be one or two refreshment outlets along with some small side shows, together with a limited number of attractions.

We have decided not to have a marquee or events which would attract people to congregate in a small area, for example, the Friday & Saturday night bands, the normal arena, the Dancing Sheep Show. Although not certain, Harris's Fun Fair are also unlikely to attend.

We are looking at a managed, timed, "Advance ticket only" entry via the sheep fair website for 1500 people

which will also provide us with the ability to record for track and trace system purposes. For this exceptional year, a small fee of £2.50 is being considered to offset the losses that will be incurred due to additional Covid-19 costs and the much-reduced income from the event. All further costs, which have been estimated to excess £2,000, will be taken from our reserve funds or covered by further sponsorship. The ticket would also serve as an entry into a Sheep Fair Raffle.

Marketing the Findon Sheep Fair as a smaller event will be a key aspect in the publicity for this year's show. We very much value the views of the residents of Findon and would like your feedback.

Findon Village WI

Our WI continues to hold monthly meetings via Zoom. Our February meeting was a presentation about the work of the Trussell Trust and the Worthing Food Bank

The Trussell Trust oversees and supports the work of over 1200 Food Banks around the country which provide emergency food to people in crisis. Their clients are referred by local agencies such as Social Workers, Debt Advice Services, Citizen's Advice Bureaux and Health Visitors. In these very challenging times the Trussell Trust Food Banks have been a lifeline to more families than ever before. Last year Worthing Food Bank provided 2184 people with emergency food for 3 days and in January 2021 they provided emergency food to 273 people. This monthly number was only exceeded in May 2020 when they provided food to 326 people. The Food Banks rely on donations from supermarkets and monetary donations from individuals with a team of volunteers fulfilling roles within the service such as befrienders, who help and speak to clients when they arrive at the centre; and bag packers who put together food and toiletry packages. During these difficult times Food Banks have had to operate very differently, using volunteer drivers to ensure food and toiletries are delivered safely. Worthing Food Bank works with local




schools and organisations to raise awareness and organise collections of food and toiletries to support people referred to them in times of crisis.

If you would like to donate toiletries please leave them in the box outside my house (7 The Chase). Washing up liquid, shaving foam, toothpaste and toothbrushes, shower gel and toilet rolls all welcome

As the case numbers fall and the vaccination numbers rise we have reason to be hopeful for some easing of restrictions this Spring with more sunshine and less rain!

Findon Village Hall Trust

The Village Hall, of course, remains closed for the moment but that does not mean that nothing is going on! I hope you have all received a leaflet highlighting our need to recruit two new committee members to cover the secretary and booking secretary roles and I am delighted to report that the campaign was successful and two new members will be joining in the over the next few weeks. I should like to take this opportunity to thank the retiring members James Heasman (acting chair then acting secretary, Tina Bedford (secretary) and Tomas Heasman (booking secretary). Their work is much appreciated.

Some of you will be aware that there has been some animated discussion in the village about the forecast costs for finishing the hall extension. This is much too complex a topic to cover in the limited space available here – involving as it does both the Village hall Trust and the Parish Council. Therefore, a comprehensive statement has been prepared and can be found on the Village Hall homepage -

https://www.findonvillagehall.com I should also mention that the highest numbers being discussed are architect's worst case estimates and include (of course) a contingency allowance.

We have also had some issues with wet rot under the floor of the foyer area and this has been addressed at minimal cost. There will be a temporary (but perfectly useable) floor for a few months so that we can lift it and confirm that the water source has been correctly identified too. That done, we need only lay the vinyl layer to finish the floor. There was some surprise, not least among the Hall committee, when the arrangements for the May elections were announced, to find that the Village Hall was not being used as a polling station this time and Findon residents would be expected to travel to the Clapham and Patching polling station in order to vote. After some fairly intensive communications we were delighted to achieve the re-instatement of our Village Hall onto the polling station list and Findon residents WILL be able to vote in the Village Hall on May 6th.

Of course, the question we all love to able to answer is WHEN can we re-open the Hall? At the time of writing, it looks like the earliest date might be May 17th (if I have interpreted the PM's announcement correctly!) and this is subject to all the caveats the government has outlined. Whether this might be a partial or a full re-opening remains to be seen and, in any case, the committee would reserve the right to proceed cautiously, should that seem wise.

In the meantime, we will continue working with the Parish Council to try and resolve the issues with the Hall extension; to prepare for the re-opening so that we can make the smoothest, fastest progress possible, given that the target could still be moving; initiate the process of updating the structure of the Findon Village Hall Trust into the updated Charity Commission preferred arrangement; and, of course, to get on with the other things that still have to be done regardless of whether the hall is open or not.

Paws Animal Sanctuary

Every one of our cat pens is occupied and we have 12 cats in all. For three days in a row a cat has arrived. The first cat's owner moved leaving the cat behind, the next one is poorly and the owner cannot manage to give it the 14 pills a day that it needs. The last one arrived yesterday because the owner is 93 years old and extremely ill and has been admitted to Worthing Hospital.

Giving medication is time-consuming and hard work. Two hens have coughs and have medicine night and morning, a guinea-pig has almost recovered after twice daily antibiotics and pain killers. I make a cocktail of all the seven pills the cat with kidney problems needs in a pipette twice a day, he has had all the tests and a scan. He hates the food the Vet recommends and he will not eat it. Also, our Pony Elvis is limping badly again. He is having four painkillers every morning and four every night. I have to crush them and hide them with Polo mints in his food. Elvis is having another x-ray this coming Monday morning. Having a plate put in his shoulder was not a successful operation and weekly acupuncture has not seen an improvement. After finishing giving all the animals their medication this morning we then discovered four of the hens have scaly legs and all needed their legs sprayed. They were not very happy! Last week we had two more hamsters in and the next day two gerbils; kids soon tire of them. I always tell the parents "Don't get them a pony!"

Even though I turn off the water to the Sanctuary every night a few mornings the pipes have been frozen, which meant going back and forth to the house for water. Then we had a burst pipe in the staff toilet, which was flooded. The next day my upstairs toilet cistern was dripping needing a washer, the carpet and underlay was floating and I am still trying to dry it out. I hope the weather forecast isn't true, my newspaper reported that the whole country is going to have a week of snow first week in March! I hope not - we all need sunshine.

Sussex Police & Crime Commissioner

Sussex Police & Crime Commissioner Katy Bourne, in partnership with the Association of Police & Crime Commissioners (APCC) has launched today a national survey, designed to understand public perception of dog theft, enforcement and the prosecution of offenders.

The Home Secretary is currently reviewing the issue of pet theft and what future enforcement may look like with potentially tougher penalties for perpetrators.

The responses to this survey will help inform the discussions that PCCs will have on this issue nationally and allow police forces to better understand the public's views on this crime and how they might improve their response to those concerns.

Demand for dogs as pets has increased during the Coronavirus pandemic. The cost of some puppies, on Pets4Homes, is currently as high as £3,000, making them a valuable commodity to criminals. According to Dog Lost, the UK's largest lost and found dog service, it is estimated thefts have risen by 250 per cent, with criminal gangs involved.

Sussex Police & Crime Commissioner Katy Bourne is spearheading the first national conversation with the public on this issue as public perception and fear is growing to an all-time high. She says:

"Pet theft, dog theft in particular, is a growing concern for the public and their fear has been perpetuated over the last couple of weeks with shocking reports in the media of more dogs being snatched by criminals. "I am incredibly eager to get more detail around this issue and understand residents' views and if they feel more could be done to respond to their concerns or for more preventative measures to be put in place to better protect their pets.

"I'm pleased to see the Home Secretary recognising the devastating impact of this crime and I hope that the results of this survey will give the Government the evidence it needs to take more robust action against perpetrators."

Sussex Police recorded 31 dog thefts in 2020 but at least 12 of those were disputes over dog ownership between known parties.

Inspector Andrea Leahy from the Sussex Police Rural Crime Team

said: "We support this national survey and the team are working tirelessly to collate information and intelligence on this worrying crime. We have dedicated officers covering the county who review every report that comes into us. We would like to encourage the public to report all suspicious circumstances and read our crime prevention advice on our website. We are dedicated to keeping your pets safe and target any persons believed to be involved in this distressing crime."


Easter Garden



The Big Freeze

The recent cold snap, combined with a trawl through some old family photographs, brought the winter of 1962/63 back to mind. The Big Freeze, as it was known, was one of the coldest winters on record in the UK and officially the coldest for 200 years. It started on Christmas Eve 1962, when it snowed in Scotland and by Boxing Day it had spread to the rest of the country, leaving 30cm of snow over many parts. A blizzard followed on 29 and 30 December across Wales and southwest England, causing snowdrifts up to 6 metres deep. Roads and railways were blocked, telephone lines brought down, and some villages were left cut off for several days. The snow lasted for two months and many areas were covered until early March. Mean maximum temperatures were below 0°C in many places during the whole of January. Rivers, lakes and even the sea froze in some areas.

I grew up in a village just outside Cardiff and the photo shows me and the extent of the snow in that area. I remember the lanes leading to the village being full of snow and nothing coming into or out of the village.

I can't remember how long the village school was closed for, but I think it was several weeks. The closure was due to not only the difficulty of teachers and pupils getting to school, but also the fact that the school only had outside toilets and they were completely frozen. This being before the digital age, our education during those weeks consisted of learning how to clear snow; where the best places to go sledging were; and how to make the best snowballs and snowmen.



I also found evidence of our parents' strategy for entertaining children in the 1960s - give them an old inner tube and plonk them on a hill. We used to spend hours seeing who could roll furthest before falling out. (Not very far if I remember correctly!)


