From the Rectory

Changing seasons always come with mixed feelings, and as we are without doubt well in to autumn now. I confess to a sense of regret that the days are shortening, the temperature is dropping, and our abundant crop of French beans is dwindling fast! Although personally I'm fortunately not affected by 'SAD' (seasonally affected disorder) there may be some of you who are, or have neighbours or friends affected by the shortening days and lack of sun. Please be mindful particularly of neighbours living alone, and if we as a church can offer any support, let me know via the Parish Office.

I am conscious that a number of parishioners across the villages have suffered a bereavement this past year and assure you of my prayers. Let me know if I can support you in any way as winter approaches. Our prayers are very much with Hugh Wyatt and the family at their loss of Jane recently. Jane was a wonderful farmer in her time at Cissbury, alongside caring for her family, and will be much missed.

I'm sure that most of you will already know that I will be retiring in early January 2026. This was not an easy decision to make as I really love being your Vicar, but I am increasingly feeling my age (I will turn 70 in November) especially at busy times in the church calendar. Chris and I have bought a bungalow in The Chase, so I will still be around, but not as your Parish Priest! Lots of people have asked who my successor will be, so I thought it might be helpful to explain something of how the Church of England works when there is a Vacancy in a Parish.

A Vacancy (or sometimes referred to as an Interregnum) occurs when the Incumbent (the Priest Licensed to serve in a Parish on behalf of the Diocesan Bishop) either moves on to a new post or retires. Although the Bishop and his Senior Clergy Team will be aware of an upcoming Vacancy (the statutory notice period is 3 months) and may well have discussed possible ways forward, nothing is actually done until the existing Priest has gone. The first step is for Churchwardens to meet with the Archdeacon and Rural Dean, at which point Sequestrators are appointed to oversee the running of the Parish and the process of a new appointment, which is always at the Diocesan Bishop's discretion. Unlike in a business context, there is no 'handover' between the new person and the previous one, which many people from outside the church find hard to understand! I think the reasoning is that it gives the Parish a Continued on page 5

space between appointments, so it is like a fresh start when a new Vicar is appointed, as well as providing an opportunity for the Parish to run things as a team, with the help of retired and visiting clergy. From personal experience as a Warden in Durrington during a Vacancy some years before my ordination, this can be a time of growth for many people as they step up to take responsibility for a certain area and it really does bring the congregation together as a team.

We are of course fortunate here as we have our Associate Vicar, Colin, who,

in the meantime, will support the Worship and Mission of the Parish, but please remember that he will not be able to do everything that currently he and I do as a team, when I have retired! Please pray for him as he prepares to work out what is possible for him to commit to once I've gone. I know you will all work together well, just as you did in the run up to Findon Sheep Fair and on the day despite the weather this year!



A24 Worthing to Horsham and Dorking Transport Improvements public engagement West Sussex County Council (WSCC) is seeking views on potential transport improvements along the A24 corridor between Worthing, Horsham and Dorking. This is part of a joint public engagement exercise being undertaken by WSCC and Surrey County Council. The comments received will help identify key constraints, issues, and opportunities that will be used to shape their plans for the corridor and enable them to seek future funding opportunities.

The area covered by the engagement exercise includes the A24 from the A25 Dorking Deepdene roundabout and nearby railway stations in Dorking, to Horsham, and to the A27 Offington Roundabout in Worthing. The area also includes the A280 Long Furlong between the A27 at Clapham and A24 at Findon because of the importance of this link in connecting the A27 with the A24.

Improvements

The types of improvements that we are considering along the A24 corridor include:

junction capacity improvements bus priority and bus stop improvements walking and cycling path improvements crossing facilities for people walking, cycling and horse-riding road safety improvements including junction modifications, safety barriers and speed limit changes

This initial engagement period will close at 11:55pm on 27 October 2025.

Findon Sheep Fair

Despite somewhat inclement weather during the morning, this year's Sheep Fair was another great success. Although this resulted in a lower than normal turnout, those who did attend provided very positive feedback.

There were the normal attractions, including the Sheep Show, Farmyard Circus, Punch & Judy, Morris Dancing, Pony Rides, Vintage Cars and much much more. Unfortunately due to restrictions relating to Avian Flu, the Birds of Prey were unable to join us this year. An added attraction this year was Bellringing. A temporary structure was erected with bells on it simulating a bell tower. Visitors were invited to have a go!

The evening events were as popular as ever. The Barn Dance was well attended, and on Saturday, a packed marquee enjoyed Murdoch's Crazy Eyes, who for the first time had a support act Blue Dakota who got the show going.

Another first this year, was a free 24 page programme which contained all you needed to know about the fair past and present. As always, the committee are indebted to all the 130 volunteers who helped over the weekend and the sponsors who generously supported us.

Sheep

For the first time in many years' sheep farmers arrived from all over the south of England in a downpour to unload their animals getting soaked through in the process. With delays on the roads due to the conditions we managed to start on time with the Shetland and Romney

sections at 9-30 am. We are the only show in the South of England that has a Shetland section and we had a record entry of 54 sheep in all classes.

We finished the morning classes at midday and this was followed by the Young Shepherds where 20 youngsters took part. A lot of these young people are the future farmers of the Industry and Katie Lovejoy from Tenterden Kent was the Young Shepherd Supreme champion.

After lunch there was another downpour while the Wool on the Hoof Championship took place but sunshine appeared when the Supreme Championship winner was decided by all the judges. The winning sheep was a Suffolk ram owned by Kevin and Sally Hasemore from Bosham West Sussex.

It is not only the judges that travel a great distance to be at the show but we have volunteers from all over, including London. Without Volunteers we couldn't put this show on, so a very big thankyou to everybody who helped over the days from Thursday to Sunday.

As the farmers drove out of the green, many were very complementary saying "Best show"

The mock auction was also a big success again showing the public what used to happen up to the year 2000 on Nepcote Green

Mobile Belfry Report from The Sheep Fair

We finally managed to get the Mobile Belfry to the Sheep Fair this year, after it being unavailable last year.

The Charmborough Ring was well received by visitors, enabling them to see how a bell works, and how bell ringers control bells to ring for Sunday Service, Weddings and Funerals and important occasions. We wanted to raise the profile of bell ringing and show how much fun it can be and how social it is as well.


We had over 170 people having a go at chiming, including many children, which is just rocking the bell to make a noise. If people were interested, and many were, we let them have a go at proper bell ringing, under instruction, as it isn't as easy as it looks. After a brief explanation, and with help, everyone was able to ring the bell at backstroke, which is half the cycle of ringing, with the experienced ringer pulling on the Sally at Handstroke to keep the bell going. Everyone who had a go managed it, some only briefly, but quite a few rang unaided for a couple of minutes, which is a great achievement. Everyone seemed to enjoy the experience.

Hopefully we will be back at a future Sheep Fair, but first we need to have a discussion on how we can improve things if needed, and how often we would like to attend.

I would like to thank Adrian Riches for sorting all the paperwork and booking the ring, The many ringers from Findon and Angmering who helped throughout the day, and June Somerville who handed out badges, talked to people about the tower and helped organise people. We literally couldn't have done it without them.

From a personal point of view, I would say the 6½ hours we were there went by in a flash. Hopefully some local towers may be contacted with people wanting to have a try at the real thing. All towers are always on the look out for anyone who would like to take part and have a go at an ancient English art, and play on the largest musical instruments arond.

Sheep Fair

It was terrific to see another successful Findon Sheep Fair enjoyed by villagers and visitors alike. The hard work undertaken by the Sheep Fair Committee well in advance of the event ensures its success, along with the significant efforts of many volunteers before, during, and after the day.

We extend sincere thanks to everyone involved for such a wonderful event, which showcased the very best of Findon's community spirit.

Findon Community Orchard

Located behind Findon Village Hall (just follow the elegant signpost), Findon Community Orchard held its open day with a healthy turnout of over 35 attendees celebrating its launch. The orchard is developing beautifully, with apple and pear trees—each marked with its own handmade pottery name tag, kindly created and donated by the wife of our Tree Warden. FPC will keep you updated on its progress and any future events in this space. In addition, we are exploring the possibility of a second location, further news will follow.

The FPC Traffic and Parking Group continues its work to ease traffic and parking challenges across Findon. Two current projects are underway to this end.

The first focuses on managing vehicle speed along road leading to Cissbury Ring, extending from Nepcote at the bottom of Nepcote Green. This stretch currently carries an outdated speed limit of 60mph, which drops to 20mph upon entering Nepcote - consistent with limits across the rest of Findon.

Several accidents have been reported, and FPC has been lobbied by concerned residents who believe this road should follow the same speed limit as the rest of the village. Recent changes to traffic regulations now give greater consideration to pedestrians and other non-vehicular users. In light of this, FPC is applying to reduce the speed limit to 20mph in line with the rest of Findon.

The second application seeks to change School Hill from a two-way road to one-way access. The direction of travel would be determined by Highways, not FPC, if the application is approved. The current two-way use frequently causes bottlenecks when entering or exiting Findon and poses a significant risk to pedestrians and children accessing St John the Baptist School.

Working with WSCC and concerned residents, FPC will be carrying out a survey to collect evidence to support these two applications, details of which will be in next month's Findon News.

We are especially keen to hear from pedestrians, equestrians, cyclists, parents, commuters, business owners and residents—anyone who uses our roads and paths. Your lived experience is vital to shaping practical, inclusive solutions.

As FPC progresses both applications, we will continue to keep the village informed of any developments.



Article from Robin Carr - LongTime Resident of Findon and Former Parish Concillor

"In 1989, with increasing traffic delays, I was keen to move out of Worthing, where my Wife, Sally and I had been living for many years, to somewhere nearer to my workplace, Pulborough.

Sally and I felt that Findon would be the ideal place and we were very lucky to find a cottage in Nepcote. Originally built as two workman's cottages in about 1780, long since converted into one cottage, it had been badly neglected and was in need of considerable renovation.

After builders had been at work for a few weeks we were beginning to think we had taken on more than we could cope with. However, to our great delight a marvellous bonus presented itself in that our builder was suspicious that there was something behind a blank wall in the hall. He removed the wall to reveal a marvellous inglenook fireplace ---see the two accompanying photos on next page.

The garden too needed lots of work to "knock it into shape" and we were surprised that the vegetable patch next to the old privy seemed exceptionally fertile. This we learnt was due to what was called the "night soil".

In about the year 2000, I decided I wanted to try and join the Parish Council. I was involved in what was the last public election involving the Parish Council. It was in fact a by election and had certain characteristics of a political election

including leafleting much of the Village, canvassing votes and phoning friends and acquaintances. A former Parish Council Chairman lived near me and always seemed somewhat fearsome. I gathered my strength and phoned her for support expecting to get "short shrift" but after half an hour we were still chatting.

On the evening of the day when the result was to be declared by the Returning Officer at the Village Hall, I was reluctant to attend expecting to be publicly humiliated but my sponsor more or less frog marched me along and to my great surprise I was duly elected. I think I was the recipient of some tactical voting because one of the other candidates was very unpopular in some quarters of the Village so that I gained a lot of votes to ensure he was not elected.

One of the earliest jobs I was involved in as a Parish Councillor was the clearance of what was then a heavily overgrown area now known as North Green. It was a major undertaking and the undergrowth was as thick as the Amazon Forest. After clearance the surface was levelled with the help of a local farmer, grass seed was sown and on a very cold December morning 900 saplings were planted along the northern boundary and have now grown into a magnificent hedge. A number of lime trees were planted next to the road which have matured nicely after 20 odd years. North Green has become a very pleasant recreational area.

Paws Animal Sanctuary

We have had a very busy month with new arrivals; all our cat pens are full. Most of the cats need visits to the vet, some need blood tests or scans and regular medications carefully administered needing charts and a lot of extra work for the volunteers.

Three Tortoises all with badly damaged shells after being bitten by the owner's dog are greatly improved, all having lukewarm baths every day eating lots of bananas, strawberries, tomatoes, melons and lettuces and grass out in a pen in the sun.

A Guineapig was dumped in a heavy downpour in a box in a local park discovered by dog walkers running for cover. He is the nicest friendliest little guineapig who loves being picked up.

Unwanted baby rabbits are a worry, people regularly buy two rabbits that turn out to be a male and a female. When they notify the shop, that they have baby rabbits the shops regularly refuse to take the babies saying they don't have room. We don't have the room either or enough Volunteers to take care of more rabbits all I can advise is when they are old enough is to do an appeal with photos to try and find homes for them.

Fortunately, I have discovered a new baby bird rescue, who was able to

take a baby pigeon who was blown out of a nest, it was icy cold so I had it round my neck under my T-shirt until 3am. It warmed up to so I put it on a heat pad wrapped in a towel, so pleased it was still alive next morning. I don't know how to tube feed a baby pigeon, I rang seven rescue numbers, all said they were full, one told me to defrost a frozen pea and put it down it's throat which I did. Eventually I was guided to a young man who has started up on his own and was experienced in tube feeding baby pigeons. One of our Volunteers took the baby bird to him who fed it and put it in an incubator. He thought the tiny baby pigeon was only one day old. Four days later the bird was still alive and he told us that it was the wrong thing putting a pea down its throat, you could still see the pea in its crop! Stacey.


